World Languages and Cultures Program Goals

The World Languages and Cultures program is designed to achieve the following goals for their students:

- Communication: Communicate in Languages Other Than English
 - Students engage in conversations, provide and obtain information, express feelings and emotions, and exchange
 - Students understand and interpret written and spoken language on a variety of topics
 - Students present information, concepts, and ideas to an audience of listeners or readers on a variety of topics
- Cultures: Gain Knowledge and Understanding of Other Cultures
 - Students demonstrate an understanding of the relationship between the practices and perspectives of the culture
 - Students demonstrate an understanding of the relationship between the products and perspectives of the culture studied
- Connections: Connect with Other Disciplines and Acquire Information
 - Students reinforce and further their knowledge of other disciplines through the foreign language
 - Students acquire information and recognize the distinctive viewpoints that are only available through the foreign language and its cultures
- Comparisons: Develop Insight into the Nature of Language and Culture
 - Students demonstrate understanding of the nature of language comparisons of the language studied to their own
 - Students demonstrate understanding of the concept of culture through comparison of the cultures studied and
- Communities: Participate in Multilingual Communities at Home and Around the World
 - Students use the language both within and beyond the school setting
 - Students show evidence of becoming life-long learners by using the language for personal enjoyment and enrichment .
